

BBC Power To The People: The Zimmers Go To Hollywood.

Power To The People is a BBC documentary series. For this episode, film-maker Tim Samuels wanted to make a film about what it's like being old in Britain. Eleanor Rigby Story

It was at a church festival in 1957 that John Lennon and Paul McCatney first met... just yards away from the grave of scullery maid Eleanor Rigby, who had died in 1939.

maid - girl servant scullery - small room for washing dishes

Nine years later, when Paul McCartney was writing the lyrics about a lonely old woman who "died in the church and was buried along with her name", he had the name Daisy Hawkins in his mind. Later he changed it to Eleanor Bygraves, after the actress, who starred with the Beatles in the film HELP! But McCartney wanted the name to sound natural, so he changed the surname to Rigby.

It is possible that Paul McCartney saw the Rigby grave and kept the name in his memory, but actually nobody knows.

The gravestone itself is regularly visited by guided tours.





And an Eleanor Rigby sculpture can be found in Stanly Street in Liverpool.
